In 1982, under first-year coach Jim Schaaf, the men's golf team has gained "the maturity necessary to show what they can do." This fall, Schaaf played each of the top twelve players in at least one tournament, an educational move which gave everyone a chance.

The team has a blend of youth and experienced talent led by sophomores Tim Robinson, Lew Dickey, and Doug Thompson and seniors Tad Buchanan, David Games, and Neil Robinson. A pair of freshmen recruits, Josh Mondry (who fired a record of 65 at the Stanford Fall Intercollegiate) and Scott Erikson and walk-on transfers Lanny Sawchuck and Randy Arvidson could very well demand playing time in their initial seasons.

In women's golf, for the first time Stanford could very well be consi dered one of the favorites for the 1982 national championship.

Coach Jim Baldwin has built his program around a talented, experienced corps of four players, namely seniors Debbie Barberio and Lon Castillo, junior Joanne Pacillo and sophomore Kathy Nine.

Baldwin expects the team to be ready for the national cham pionship. "We're going to treat the NCAA like any other national tournament . . . We're not going to take it for granted just because it's on our home course." How has the team outlook shifted in 1982? No. where but UP!
